I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On September 30, 2015, the Cooperative Agreement No AID-A-12-0002 entitled "Dominican Republic At-Risk Youth Initiative," coined in Spanish as "Alerta Joven" between USAID and Entrena, reached its three-year anniversary. A total of 21 months remain for actual implementation with project close-out scheduled for July 5, 2017.

Alerta Joven is an ambitious initiative aiming to reduce levels of crime and violence through integrated and multi-disciplinary activities that provide increased opportunities in education, employment insertion, and health for youth with risk factors caused by marginalization and disenfranchisement. The initiative includes policy issues, information systems, and partnerships to positively impact the capability of our youth to become productive citizens.

Summarized numerical results are the following:

Total amount of participating youth with defined at risk categories registered to date in the tracking system is 90,104 of a target population of 85,000 which is 106%. Of these, 60,936 were registered during year 3.

The overall gender distribution is 56.3% female and 43.7% male. Age distribution is 64.7% 11 to 17 years and 35.3% 18 to 24 years.

Budget execution stands at 59% and cost share at 65%. (See Attachment 4)

A total of 23 implementing organizations with sub-awards carry out activities in the targeted Duarte Corridor geographic zone covering 9 provinces and 748 *barrios* or high crime urban neighborhoods. To date, Alerta Joven has worked with 6 Dominican government (GoDR) ministries and over 10 municipal governments. A total of 20 private-public partnerships have been developed.

The major focus during Year 3 was Entrena working closely with the partner implementing organizations to significantly improve the quality of their services, compliance with the tracking system, and overall technical and financial management. This included performance ranking systems, evaluation workshops with each partner, increased field visits, and specialized trouble shooting for the tracking system and employment insertion component.

The results have been increased numbers, upgraded credibility of Alerta Joven interventions, and substantial empowerment by our partners. Unique products during this year were high level research on future jobs in the Dominican economy and training requirements, regional and national self-employment fairs, and consolidation of school retention and re-insertion programs.

This third annual report starts with a recap of Alerta Joven and then summarizes the numbers, presents the faces of our youth, reviews the results, and finalizes by examining the challenges. The Attachment 14 describe each partner organization, present the detailed indicators and results, and review the most important activities of the year. But most importantly, we hope this report transmits the enthusiasm and commitment of our youth. Despite all their conditions of risk and being surrounded by environments of crime and violence, they are hopeful and only await that one opportunity to make a positive difference.

II. RECAP OF ALERTA JOVEN

The name Alerta Joven was selected from a competition of participating youth in September 2012. The author is Genesis Sosa (17) from the *barrio* of Los Minas in northeastern Santo Domingo. The name stresses that Dominican youth need to be alert – on the lookout – to not cave under the pressures and temptations of crime and violence in their communities, but rather to make the best of the opportunities that become available to them.

The purpose of Alerta Joven is to create a sustainable, multidisciplinary safety net for at-risk youth implemented to prevent crime. This safety net is a back-up support network where a young person who may be a first offender, deserted from school, or a teenage mother can come into confianza or confidence to rediscover hope, and connect with practical solutions and opportunities to improve and move on with their lives. Crime is prevented because conditions of risk are significantly ameliorated when youth have viable alternatives and thereby can access practical options to improve their educational, employability, health, and legal status.

The project has identified different risk conditions where the highest include the following: 59.5% participants with STI risks, 52% participants with labor risk (under exploitative labor conditions or with low incomes), 36.7% with pregnancy risk, and 35.6% at risk for criminal activity¹. Alerta Joven operates primarily in urban settings in seven provinces that make up the "Duarte Corridor." The target population is distributed into two major age groupings – 11 to 17 years and 18 to 24 years with equality of gender. The prime organization is Entrena, a Dominican organization, along with 26 partner organizations, of which 23 are local Dominican, two international, and one of mixed Dominican/international origin. The total budget, including cost share, is \$ 23,626,630, and the project duration is five years, ending in July 2017.

Alerta Joven will produce three major results:

- 1. Improve the Youth Protection Policy in Practice This includes empowering youth stakeholders to participate in policy decisions, making sure that all agencies understand and comply with the legal framework for youth in the DR, and increasing the documentation of at-risk youth.
- 2. Create opportunities for at-risk youth to become productive citizens are increased through education, employment insertion, and health services.
- 3. Develop an integrated youth system incorporating a state-of-the-art information system, innovative solutions to reduce crime through multi-disciplinary groups, and the creation of public-private partnerships for support and advocacy.

The geographic distribution of Alerta Joven activities is in Attachment 1, and the detailed results framework for the project can be found in Attachment 2.


Alerta Joven has a commitment to long-term sustainability once funding from USAID ends, and based upon the experience and opportunities during the first three years, is currently evaluating the final strategy and mechanism that gives us the best shot at reaching the goal of sustainability.

III. ALERTA JOVEN IN NUMBERS

At the three year mark, Alerta Joven has exceeded the original target population number of 85,000 participants. By September 30, 2015, our tracking system verifies that 90,104 youth have benefited from the services provided by Alerta Joven. Age groupings are predominately adolescents and younger youth from the 11 to 17 years age group.

Education Component Results

- 12,090 participated in school retention programs in 131 schools.
- **8,750** participants have attended the EpC school retention model and **2,678** completed the program.
- 200 new teachers received Quantum Learning training in accelerated learning methodologies during year 3
- 150 new EpC's operated in 10 municipalities during year 3
- 1,013 participants were mainstreamed into public schools resulting from their participation in school insertion programs.



Documentation

- 2,073 participants identified without birth certificate.
- 379 have successfully obtained their legal documentation.
- 1,193 participants received extensive legal assistance and counseling for obtaining documentation.

Health Results

More than 30 peer to peer networks were formed with more than 6,000 youth multipliers in 10 municipalities.

- **2,927** received youth friendly medical care at 8 clinics distributed in Duarte corridor.
- 2,024 received HIV tests and results were delivered.
- **144** participants from Most at Risk Population have been reached over these three years. **47.9**% are considered by themselves as commercial sex workers.
- **68.1%** of the males and **63.9%** of females reported using a modern contraceptive method.

Employment for Youth Increased

- **17,341** participants have participated in vocational, entrepreneurship and microcredits courses.
- 7,862 of the above received entrepreneurship training sessions
- 9,137 participants completed technical and vocational training courses.
- 672 participants presented 169 new business ideas at the regional/national selfemployment and entrepreneurship fair.
- 1,970 received new or better employment after technical training from Alerta Joven.
- 60 participants received microcredit loans and 20 were awarded seed capital money as winners of the national self-employment fair.

- **26** youth committees actively engaged
- **3,062** participants have received training in the application of the youth legal framework

Comprehensive Information System Developed

IV. THE FACES AND BACKGROUNDS OF OUR YOUTH

The Dominican Republic is a middle-income country with an impressive average growth rate of 5.5% between 1991 and 2013 ^[2]. With an economy fueled by tourism, mining, free zones for goods and services, and remittances from the large Dominican diaspora abroad, the outlook for sustained growth is bright. The major problem is the unequal distribution of growth. Like most urban areas in the DR, Santo Domingo and major cities are surrounded by rings of misery. Many of these *barrios* emerged after the assassination of the dictator Trujillo in 1961 and the resulting rural to urban migration. This trend still continues. This is where the youth of Alerta Joven survive.

Living in these conditions means you are a survivor. You are marginalized and disenfranchised. Your access to formal and reliable public services, such as education, health, decent housing, water, sewage, and electricity, is limited. Your escape routes are extremely challenging. In education, graduating from high school is a farfetched possibility; graduating from college is a dream. Plus, what you have witnessed from peers indicates that improved education does not necessarily translate into improved income. Obtaining a decent job in the formal sector of the economy is a long shot; and once employers know where you live, they will pass you over. You know the easier shorter routes are wrong but nevertheless produce money — micro-trafficking, prostitution, gangs, etc. or getting on a *yola* headed to Puerto Rico.

Recent Alerta Joven supported studies with the Attorney General Office show that those who take the easy but wrong route have similar characteristics – they began having sex around 13 years of age, 57.3% dropped out of school before completing 8th grade, 71.3 % lived alone with their mother, and only 47% had seen their father every day in the last year. The studies surveyed youth currently in detention centers and in conflict with the law ⁽³⁾.

Alerta Joven identifies and works with those youth in high-risk situations who have not yet taken the wrong path but could easily do so. Alerta Joven develops their self-esteem, encourages them to discover their talents and potential, and gives them access to educational, employment, and health opportunities.

The following paragraphs are brief stories of our youth participants – each one different and from various areas of the country – but each one trusting that Alerta Joven can make a difference in their lives.

Fleudy Elias de Jesús, 22 years - IDDI in Bonao



Fleudy Elias lives in Bonao, in the humble neighborhood of Villa Liberación. Before joining the Alerta Joven Project he was just another troubled young man in the community and was marginalized due his bad behavior. Fleury spent most of his time on the streets and rarely missed opportunities to steal.

However, he had the opportunity to attended vocational training opportunities offered by IDDI through Alerta Joven. Through these courses he realized that the future he was searching for could not be found on the streets.

Fleudy said that thanks to Alerta Joven, he is a new person. He now has a profession as a barber. He believes that his dream to become a better person came true due to the Alerta Joven training he received from IDDI in

Bonao, where he continues benefiting from support and guidance.

Joel Luis Nuñez, 18 years old — Universidad Católica Nordestana (UCNE) in San Francisco de Macorís

Since he was a child, Joel's passion was baseball. He started to play at the age of 10, dreaming to become a professional baseball player from his home town of San Francisco de Macorís. By the age of 14, he had caught the eyes of several MLB scouts. But his dream vanished when he suffered a terrible shoulder injury and his family didn't have the money to pay for the therapy he needed to recover.

Losing his dream of baseball, he became severely depressed, with no goals or motivation to move on with his life. But one day he showed up at the Ercilia Pepin School and joined an entrepreneurship and employability course held by Alerta Joven. There he learned to plan for and initiate his own business, a music production company.



Joel Luis found a new dream and motivation. Several months later he took part in the regional self-employment fair and received a prize for winning first place with his business called the "056 Studio".

Maria Mercedes Rosario, 17 years - Children International, Santo Domingo East

Maria Mercedes Rosario is the second of five siblings. She lives with her mother and also has a son of her own. Maria didn't have a birth certificate which limited her access to formal education. She was only allowed to sit in and monitor classes without certification to prove her successful completion of the coursework and tests required for each grade.

As a result of the Alerta Joven documentation program implemented by Children International in the community of Mendoza, she received her legal birth certificate. Her attendance and completion of each grade in school is now correctly documented and certified.



In addition, Maria Mercedes participated in the vocational and life skills training program entitled "The Company". This course provides participants with an opportunity to practice what they are learning, promotes personal responsibility and helps them to determine their vocation.

Odalis Miguel Lora García, 21 years, Sur Futuro, Villa Lisa, Haina – San Cristóbal

"Making mistakes is human, but when we don't forgive, our mistakes walk into a labyrinth that causes us to doubt our humanity" stated Odalis Lora, a young man from Villa Lisa, Haina.

"Previously I did not respect my colleagues nor my neighbors, I treated others badly and was very rebellious", testified Odalis.



"I was raised by my grandparents. It was so terrible for me when my grandmother passed away. After that, I started the bad behaviors in my life, "el tigueraje". I began committing crimes and fell into the trap of hard drugs. I began to spend all my time stealing. I began to lose control of my life. This was so strong that I did not know what to do, I felt I was totally lost", he added.

"I thank God that when I was abandoned by everyone else, the Lord held me in his hands and took me to a youth camp organized by Alerta Joven – Sur Futuro. That started a change in my life with no turning back. The Bible says in Psalm 10: "Though my father and mother forsake me, the LORD will receive me. I thank God for his love and mercy."

"I also thank Alerta Joven for accepting me with my past, my mistakes, for giving me an opportunity and the confidence I need to move forward. They are now training me in a technical course so I can get a job and find a better future."

Katiulca Santos, 12 years old – CEPROSH, Puerto Plata



school in the city.

Katiulca Santos is 12 year old and lives in one of the most vulnerable areas of Puerto Plata where she encounters danguerous situations such as prostitution and drug sales. Katiulca says she looks like a "tomboy", and as she herself tells, the formation of her personality was influenced by the company of young males. Since childhood her behavior was rebellious and careless. This attitude resulted in her expulsion from several schools.

Alerta Joven came to her community with the Spaces to Growth program (Espacios para Crecer), giving her an opportunity to improve her behavior, go back to school and change the type of friends she had. With the support of Alerta Joven, Katiulca received a letter of recommendation and she was accepted at a

Grecia Leticia Castillo Jesus, 20 years, Children International Santo Domingo East

Grecia Leticia Castillo Jesus, better known in the community with the nickname "Letty" is a 20 year old young adult without documentation, which limited her possibilities to overcome the cycle of poverty.

Letty's dreams are ambitious. She yearns to start her own company, "D'Letty Carteras", dedicated to the production of creative and customized handbags for retail and wholesale. But in order to achieve this and to enter the world of entrepreneurship, she has discovered that she needs a birth certificate.



To make it happen, Letty has participated in various training courses in entrepreneurship. Letty took part and won first

prize at the Santo Domingo Regional Entrepreneurship Fair sponsored by Alerta Joven earlier this year. She also qualified for the 2015 National Self-Employment and Entrepreneurship Fair celebrated in August, where she took 9th place.

Letty discovered that it was important to have documentation to participate in these and other events and that to access the monetary awards received at the fairs, she had to open a bank account - an impossible task without a valid birth certificate.

She is in the final steps of the documentation process. In the meantime, D'Letty Carteras remains as the symbol for young people who wish to fulfill their dreams, become a self-sufficient adult and overcome poverty.

Angel Miguel Rodríguez, 15 years - CEPROSH, Puerto Plata



My name is Miguel Angel Rodriguez; I was born on November 22, 1999. I live in Puerto Plata with my grandparents and my father. I am the oldest of three brothers. I was motivated to go to school because I want to be somebody in life and to prove that that no matter which neighborhood you live in, you can succeed.

Thanks to Alerta Joven I have recognize the importance of returning to school. Now that I am part of this project, I feel that my life has changed and the community now sees me in a different way.

Before, I was fighting everyone all the time, and because of that I was expelled from the school. Alerta Joven really changed my life. I'm transformed because of all the support I have been receiving.

Rosanny Sanchez Menna, 20 years old – Dream Project, Sabaneta de Cangrejos

Rosanny's success story is one that not only makes us proud but also spreads the word about excellent programs of the Alerta Joven project, by demonstrating how employment opportunities are generated. At 20 years old, Rosanny is currently in her fourth year of high school and has had no prior job experience nor has she ever participated in a technical training course.

Throughout the A Ganar program, she was one of our most motivated students, but her determination particularly stood out at the end. During the professional development and employability phase, the students are required to take part in an employment interview with local business managers.





Rosanny was so convincing during her interview that the owner of Mojito Bar, one of the most famous restaurants in Cabarete, contracted her on the spot. The next morning, Rosanny began work as a bartender at Mojito. She graduated from the A Ganar course and four months later continues to work at the bar.

Yeidi Yadira Castro, 11 years, Children International Santo Domingo East



Yeidy Yocaira Castro is an 11 year old girl who participates in the Space for Growth program (Espacio para Crecer - EpC) located in Colegio Las Frutas, in the Mendoza neighborhood.

She was an extremely shy girl, with low self-esteem and poor academic performance.

She herself expressed, "To be participant of an EpC has been a unique experience". Yeidy adds that the "EpC has transformed her life from the inside".

As a result, Yeidy now takes full advantage of her classes and is motivated to excel. "When I grow up I want to be a doctor. That's my dream, and my dreams can come true with focus and perseverance" says Yeidy.

Jose Miguel Flores, 20 years old - Universidad Católica Nordestana (UCNE) in San Francisco de Macorís

Jose Miguel Flores, a young man of 20, is from San Francisco de Macorís. Before participating in a vocational training course sponsored by the Universidad Católica Nordestana through Alerta Joven, he was considered a Dominican "Ni – Ni", the expression in Spanish applied for youth who neither work nor study.

With the encouragement of his instructor Eddy Guava, he took part and completed a job skills training course on residential electrical installation and repair. After receiving his diploma and persevering in his search for employment, Jose Miguel found a job in Telenord, a large TV cable company in San Francisco de Macorís.

Currently Jose Miguel works in Telenord and he is deeply grateful to Alerta Joven and his teacher/mentor for helping him to become more than just another unproductive statistic.



Arisleyda Hernandez, 16 years - CEPROSH, Puerto Plata



Arisleyda Hernandez is the third of four children living with her parents in a rural area near the city of Puerto Plata. At age 13 she became pregnant, forcing her to drop out of school.

Arisleyda has had to work to provide for her one year old baby as the father never assumed responsibly and her parents earn just enough to support their own children.

Alerta Joven came to the community where Arisleyda lives with a program of getting back in school. In one of the meetings held in her community, she expressed motivation and eagerness to return to school in order to provide a better life to her son.

Through Alerta Joven, Arisleyda was reinserted into school, and at this moment is attending 7th grade in the evening shift. Teachers state that she is putting forth her best efforts. Arisleyda

is also participating in the health program components of Alerta Joven.

Ángel Javier Feliz, 17 years – CSA, Santo Domingo

Ángel Javier Feliz Javier is a 17-year-old from Batey Caballona in western Santo Domingo. He became aware of the benefits of Alerta Joven through an initial workshop organized in his community to introduce the program. Since then, his life has been transformed.

In his own words he states: "On a personal and professional level I have benefited from Alerta Joven. My community has had the opportunity to receive technical trainings and more importantly, we have acquired skills to get a job. My family has also benefited, as my sister participated in the Space for Growth program (Espacio para Crecer, EPC)".

Thanks to the project, Angel feels very motivated and focused. "I want to keep moving forward, and help in my

community too", stated Angel. That's why he is forming a nonprofit organization to contribute solutions for his community and stimulate an environment free from bad habits and addictions.

Arismendy De Jesús Hernández, 17 years - CEPROSH, Puerto Plata

My name is Arismendy De Jesus Hernandez, I was born on May 4, 1998. I have five brothers and I live with my parents, my brothers and my nephew in the city of Puerto Plata.

I left school because I started to work in a furniture upholstery business and had no time to study. I heard about the Alerta Joven project which offered me the chance to study and helped me to get enrolled in school. Ever since I've been involved in the project, my behavior has improved at home and on the street. I feel that I am a better person now.

My dream is to go to college and become an engineer. I'm sure that I can be a good man and serve my community. I want to thank Alerta Joven, because they gave me the opportunity to return to school.



Rosilenny Rosario Reyes, 15 years - Children International Santo Domingo East.



Rosilenny Rosario Reyes is a 15 year old adolescentl living in extreme poverty and overcrowding in the community of Mendoza. For Rosilenny, being able to study was a priority. But her dreams and expectations were blocked because she didn't have the birth certificate required to enroll in school.

Rosy (her nickname) obtained her birth certificate through the Alerta Joven documentation program. As a result, her self-confidence and self-esteem have increased. She has enrolled in school and is closer to realizing her dreams.

According to Rosy, "Alerta Joven has already made two of my dreams come true, to get a birth certificate and

to return to school both of which are basic requirements to become a productive person".

V. GOALS AND RESULTS TO DATE

This section of the report provides a summarized overview of the results of Alerta Joven at the end of year 3. This data is organized by the project's three major intermediate results and their three main outcomes. Each one has a brief introductory narrative, graphs where available portraying indicators and results, and an analysis of the results. More detailed results and indicator performance can be found in Attachment 3 - Indicators and Results.

IR 1 – Improvement of Youth Protection Policy

The gap between laws and their actual implementation is significant in the DR, and the youth sector is no exception. Alerta Joven provides support for youth stakeholders to become more engaged in the formulation of the policies which affect them, works with organizations for improved understanding and compliance with the legal framework affecting youth, and provides guidance and support for improved documentation of at-risk youth.

IR1.1 – Empowerment by Youth Stakeholders to Influence Policy – Alerta Joven continues working closely with United Nation Populations Fund (UNFPA) and the Ministry of Youth (MJ) in the development of the National Youth Plan incorporating report recommendations with suggestions for insertions channeled to the Ministry of Youth

Additional empowerment actions during year 3 included the following:

Santiago- Strengthening of the *Consejos Municipales* (Municipal Councils) of El Punal, Villa Gonzalez and El Cantaro. Participation by the MJ local representative in the process of summiting youth demands to the council. He also participates in all project planning meetings for the area. These councils were able to access from the municipalities funds for youth empowerment activities such as local forums, round tables to discuss youth issues, and organization of youth fairs.

Boca Chica: The Consejo Municipal of Boca Chica continues to gain momentum in the local agenda of the municipality of La Caleta. Due to the demands by the council, the municipality reopened their youth office.

Haina: Local youth agenda developed until 2017. Includes an action plan to receive funding from the municipality. Currently funding transportation for all youth taking technical vocational training under Alerta Joven.

Los Alcarrizos: During year 3, JADOM signed an agreement with COCDELA, which is the local network of organizations. They agreed to create a sub-committee called Cocdela Joven which focuses on coordinating activities for youth with the local municipality.

One major weakness we face in this area is the institutional debility and politicization of the Ministry of Youth (with the exception of Santiago), which is the GODR agency that should take the leadership role in youth policy.

A complete inventory of interventions, agreements and achievements reached by partner organizations related to youth policy during the first 3 years of the project can be found in Attachment 5.

IR1.2 - Institutional Understanding/Compliance with Legal Framework for Youth — During year 3, Entrena continued to strengthen the capabilities of implementing partners for compliance with the youth legal framework component. Organizations have taken ownership of this themes and their influence has grown within the ongoing development of public policy in their municipalities. Organizations like Sur Futuro, Project Hope, Casa Abierta, Ceprosh and Children International have taken additional steps in the formulation of local agendas and plans which include municipal stakeholders. A sample plan can be reviewed on Attachment 2 — Agenda de Desarrollo Local Juventud, Municipio de Haina of Quarterly Report April — June 2015. As a result of these efforts, more than 110 representatives from 82 community based organizations are participating in compliance oversight of the youth legal frameworks within their municipalities.

Gravidelvis Paulino Mercedes, 16 years old, from Profamilia in San Francisco de Macorís, is a good example of commitment in sharing information concerning youth. "I have the opportunity to share information with other young people. It is important to me to give to others what I have received because giving the information means saving lives." He is part of a team of Multiplicadores de Espacios Informales (METI) or Multipliers of Informal Spaces whose main role is visiting the local business (markets, barbershops, hair and beauty salons, mechanic and repair shops, and internet cafes) and delivering information about HIV prevention and correct usage of condoms.


IR 1.3 – Increased Documentation of Youth – The documentation component has been incredibly challenging for the project during this period. The grace period of the National Plan for Documentation of Migrant Population (Plan Nacional de Regularización) ended on June 17, 2015. Most of the cases of regularization from Alerta Joven are currently in stages of processing. Despite the bureaucratic complexities associate with the process, we have been able to complete documentation for 379 participants to date.

Most cases for non-documented youth during this year 3 are concentrated in the areas of Haina, Boca Chica, Villa Mella, Distrito Nacional and Santiago.

Plans for year 4 will follow up with these steps. Alerta Joven is keenly aware that the at-risk youth population of Haitian descent born in the DR (who do not speak Creole or have ever been to Haiti) continues to be disenfranchised due to documentation issues, and the potential for delinquent and violent activities is exacerbated.



Year 3 Results - October 1, 2014 to September 30, 2015




I10: Number of undocumented youth who are identified

Total Accumulated versus Target to Date - July 5, 2012 to September 30, 2015




Indicator 10: For year three, the project identified 1,177 participants from of a total target of 1,500. Of these cases, 56% were females and the 44% males. The accumulated three year totals show 2,076 participants identified as undocumented, which represents 83.20% of the total target of 2,500 participants. The accumulative three year distribution between male and female is 46% and 54% respectively.

Indicator 11: For year 3, a total of 379 participants previously identified as undocumented, obtained their documentation. This number represents 32% of the total undocumented participants identified in the same period which is considerably higher than the 10% established as the target. The accumulated three year total is 18% which is also higher than the 10% established as the accumulative target.

An analysis of documentation indicator results reveals that we have the correct strategy and are on the right path for proper documentation. The DR Constitutional Court Ruling No. 168-13, regardless of its controversial nature, has generated an established protocol for documentation through the corresponding governmental organizations. We continue to expect an increase in youth being documented as an increasing number participate in educational and employment insertion activities where documentation is required.

IR 2 – Increase of Opportunities for Youth to Become Productive Citizens

Creating viable access and linkage for at-risk youth to employment, educational, and health services is critical for helping them to continue on with their lives, distance themselves from crime, and become productive citizens and help others in their community to escape from marginalization and potential crime.

IR 2.1 – Formal and alternative education opportunities increased

The following section summarizes the Alerta Joven educational component. For detailed information and data, please see Attachments 6, 7 and 8.

The educational component of Alerta Joven continues to focus on school retention (students in risk of dropping out) and reinsertion (students who have already dropped out and need to be mainstreamed back into school). The focus on these two factors directly takes into account the direct link between delinquency and dropping out of school.

Our educational activities directly integrate the use of accelerated learning methodology. Adolescents who have left school or are over aged in their respective classrooms need learning tools which allow them to discover their potential to learn and then allows them to acquire new information and learning in the fastest way possible. This is the only way in which adolescents and youth with high risk factors can "catch up" and not fall behind for the rest of their lives. We are well aware of the relationship between less years of school and future income production and social stability.

Our educational models need to make learning fun and have the flexibility to deal with all the outside factors which influence our target population. This is why we use tested and creative models such as the *Espacios para Crecer* (EpC) (Spaces to Grow), *Las Ventajas de Permanecer en la Escuela* (LVPE) (The Advantages of Staying in School), and Quantum Learning programs for students and teachers.

During year 3, the following educational activities were carried out:

152 EpCs for a total of 4,560 participants between the ages of 11 and 14.


4,857 participants reached in LVPE program between the ages of 11 and 17

Quantum Learning for students focusing on individual learning skills for 217 participants.

7 Quantum Learning workshops on accelerated learning methodology for 420 public school teachers and directors.



I14: Number of learners enrolled in primary schools and/or equivalent non-school-based setting with USG support





Indicator 14: 89.43% of the target for primary school for year 3 was achieved and 72.82 % has been achieved for the entire three year period as of 9/30/15. Gender distribution for direct participants continues to be equal – during year 3, a total of 3,809 participants were male and 3,837 were female. The accumulated three year totals have 5,268 males and 5,109 females.

Indirect participants are individual stakeholders who either support or are benefited by these activities without being registered as unique participants in the Alerta Joven tracking system. In the proposed PMEP for FY16, the project plans to reduce considerably the target amount of indirect participants because all Alerta Joven educational interventions are specifically focused on direct beneficiaries.


Reasons for improved results include (1) Increased strengthening and empowerment by implementing organizations which consolidated educational interventions during year three (2) Increased credibility based upon proven results from previous years (3) Increased buy in and support from public school officials at the community level once they witnessed improved students' performance (4) More experienced and empowered EpC facilitators and local teachers and (5) Inclusion of new programs such as LVPE and QL for students.

I15: Number of learners enrolled in secondary schools and/or equivalent non-based setting with USG support



Indicator 15: 59.44% of the target for secondary school for year 3 was achieved and 66.01% has been achieved for the entire three year period as of 9/30/15. Gender distribution for direct participants continues to favor greater female participation – during year 3, a total of 2,530 participants were male and 3,075 were female. The accumulated three year totals have 3,820 males and 4,275 females.


Increases in results for this high school population group are due to the factors of increased empowerment, experience, and credibility as highlighted for the activities for the 11-17 year age group. However, two additional factors were (1) The inclusion of Quantum Learning for students, which is more individually focused for this age group and (2) The LVPE program which is more focused for high school students, many of whom are overaged.

Indicator 16: 75.91% of the target for school reinsertion for year 3 was achieved and 46.85% has been achieved for the entire three year period as of 9/30/15. Gender distribution for direct participants slightly favors greater male participation – during year three, 447 participants were male and 374 were female. The accumulated three year totals have 543 males and 470 females. This is a reflection of more males out of school and correlates with the entry participant survey.

Significant increases in results occurred during year 3 due to (1) Higher level of compliance demanded by Entrena of implementing organizations for this specific indicator (2) Best practices identified and replicated through partner organizations which ensures more direct follow up and intervention per participant (3) Reinsertion is an ongoing process and we are seeing the investments in activities from previous years and (4) Schools under construction during previous years were finished thereby increasing the number of available spaces and classrooms.

IR 2.2 - Improved Access to Quality Health Prevention and Care

The following section summarizes the Alerta Joven health component. For detailed information and data, please see Attachment 9.

Our at-risk youth population in the DR is frequently exposed to unhealthy lifestyles. A combination of early initiation in sexual activity, unprotected sex, and the difficulty in accessing direct health services that are youth-friendly and caring are major obstacles.

Out of a total of 51,914 registered Alerta Joven beneficiaries who completed the health survey, 31.5% were sexually active in the baseline survey; from those 53.1% were males who initiate at 13 years. 55.7% used condoms in their last sexual intercourse.


Staying healthy, using protection when having sex, not getting pregnant at an early age and avoiding abusive relationships, are important factors for Alerta Joven participants. Achieving these health goals are central for our target population since they enhance the possibility of youth moving forward with their education and employment. Alerta Joven integrates a variety of educational, training, employment insertion, and self-employment services for young people who are starting their working lives. Nonetheless, an unwanted pregnancy or sexually transmitted infection (syphilis, HIV) can dramatically change that young person's life and growth opportunities, and this often occurs due to a lack of information.

The Alerta Joven health component is a combination of HIV, education, prevention programs, and to a lesser scale, direct health services. Health activities for at-risk youth use innovative interventions based on evidence, diminishing risk factors, motivational interviews, and behavior change. These are supported by training workshops carried out by CAI (CICATELLI). While these interventions are focused on health, they also strengthen the young person's ability to make sound decisions related to health and employment, thereby strengthening the overall impact of Alerta Joven.

Year 3 marks the end of the active implementation of these health services for Alerta Joven due to the modified priorities in target populations by PEPFAR which resulted in the elimination of funding for health activities. However, due to the impact achieved with the at risk youth participants, selected Alerta Joven implementing partners will continue with interventions in the health components with funding from the GoDR and other sources.




I21: Number of individuals who received Testing and Counseling (T&C) services for HIV and received their test results.

IR 2.3 – Increase of Employment for Youth

The Alerta Joven strategy for employment insertion integrates assessment and identification of emerging and future job opportunities in the Dominican economy, job skill training in consonance with these opportunities, life skill employability training applicable to all employment demands,

and the facilitation of entrepreneurship and self-employment possibilities coupled with microcredit.

Accumulated figures for three years as of September 30, 2015 are the following:

17,915 youth participating in job skills training program

469 received orientation and follow up on how to obtain a microcredit loan

8 employment and self-employment fairs implemented

9,170 receiving orientation on entrepreneurship

The major activities during year 3 for the employment component were the following:

Comprehensive study and research focused on emerging job tendencies and training requirements in the DR entitled "Estudio Prospectivo sobre Demandas de Cualificaciones Tecnico-Profesionales en República Dominicana" (Study of Technical-Professional Qualifications demanded by the Dominican Labor Market). This study is unique and different from previous research because (1) it covers the largest sample of any business survey carried out previously (2) the focus on technical skills and vocational training which is the strength of Alerta Joven and (3) this projects the most demanded job skills by the Dominican economy until 2020.


Total of 6 regional and self-employment fairs culminating in one national event with a total of 169 new self-employment and entrepreneurship proposals.

Implementation of best practice employment insertion and self-employment models such as A Ganar and the Chilean FOSIS program.

Direct conversations with business sponsored organizations such as CAPEX in Santiago to directly implement job skills training for Alerta Joven youth and follow up job opportunities.



I22: Number of persons receiving new employment or better employment (including better selfemployment) as a result of participation in USG-funded workforce development programs




Total Accumulated versus Target to Date - July 5, 2012 to September 30, 2015



Reasons for these numbers are the following: (1) The M&E team from Alerta Joven designed a labor survey which allowed each implementing organization to identify and closely follow participants from training courses who obtained new or better employment including self-employment (2) Increased credibility by the business sector of the quality of training received by Alerta Joven participants and (3) Direct follow up by the nine labor insertion specialists with the private sector.

Year 3 Results - October 1, 2014 to September 30, 2015








Indicator 23: 179% of the target for year 3 was achieved for total participants and 134.37% of the accumulated target for the three year period has been achieved. 130.54% of the target for year 3 was achieved for male participants and 101.21% of the accumulated target for the three year period has been achieved. 227.45% of the target for year 3 was achieved for female participants and 167.53% of the accumulated target for the three year period has been achieved. Reasons for these high percentages are (1) Increased credibility and experience in the employment component by implementing organizations (2) Organizations were more empowered and focused in this component due to increased oversight and leadership by Entrena (3) Inclusion of nine labor insertion specialists assigned to each province under the direct supervision of the Entrena employment specialist and (4) Increased availability and linkage with INFOTEP in providing training opportunities for the Alerta Joven at risk populations.


I24: Proportion of female participants in USG-assisted programs designed to increase access to productive economic opportunities

Indicator 24: The target is to have equal gender participation. During year 3, the percentage of female participation is 61.56 % and the accumulated three year total is 61.16%. The majority percentage for female participation is due to (1) Higher percentage of female participation in educational and training based activities reflected in all national surveys (2) Training courses, while

having a non-gender focus, have content more attractive to female participation and (3) There is a higher percentage of female participation across the board in Alerta Joven which is a reflection of our participating at-risk population.

IR 3 – Development of Integrated Youth System

Alerta Joven expects to integrate a state-of-the-art information and tracking system, model community based crime prevention committees and public-private partnerships as part of the overall safety net for our at-risk youth.

IR 3.1 – Implementation of Comprehensive Information System

Significant progress was made on the web platform during year 3. The most important improvement over this period was the increased stability and robustness of the web platform which has positively impacted the project by increasing the level of trust among our partners and also the quality of the data. As of September 2015, the web platform had a total of **123,508** Registration Forms (Direct and Indirect), **49,815** Survey forms, and **20,471** Attendance Lists. A total of **104,307** beneficiaries (Direct and Indirect) have received at least one service from the Alerta Joven multidisciplinary safety network.

The Alerta Joven web platform allows us to uniquely identify each beneficiary across the multidisciplinary safety network. The services provided to each beneficiary can be easily tracked down using the different modules of the web platform. These services can be classified by program or by service type for convenience of the users. Furthermore, the web platform allows both analysts and evaluators to access the information in a multilevel granularity. To illustrate this, Figure 1 shows fine grain information about the total number of services received by a set of beneficiaries, while Figure 2 shows higher level of detail regarding the total number of beneficiaries in the project.



Throughout the year, the M&E team maintained an active exchange of ideas and suggestions with the RTI technology team in order to implement improvements to the platform. The constant feedback allowed new features to be implemented such as: validations for data entry fields, alerts, confirmation messages, make distinctions between collateral/non-collateral beneficiaries, and multiple view options for downloading surveys and registrations, among others. Additionally, several errors and/or unexpected behavior were detected by both the M&E team and our partners while using the platform. These issues were corrected as soon as they were detected or put ontrack to be picked up on the next task.

In order to fulfil the demand for summarized data and knowledge extraction from the M&E team and the operative team, a new module for reports was created for the web platform. The module had a total of eight (8) reports released by December 2014, and now it has a total of twenty-one (21) reports. Some of the most relevant reports available by this module are, 'Total participants for Gender and Age by Activity Amount, Organization, Program and Activity type', 'Comparing Exit Forms and Survey Forms', 'Totals for Closing Activities', 'Comparing Exit Form and Survey Form', 'I10: Youth without Birth Certificate', 'I13: Youth NiNi', and 'I17: Usage of Contraceptive Methods'.

During this year, the auxiliary team of data entry clerks continued processing the attendance lists that were accumulated over the early years of the project. Incorporating the auxiliary team had positive effects on the project. First, it accelerated the upload of attendance lists into the database allowing the M&E team to have an up-to-date status of the project. Secondly, the load of work on the partners' side was reduced significantly allowing them to have time to catch-up with their

backlog of pending forms. The auxiliary team finished processing 6,365 attendance lists as of March 2015.

On May 2015, RTI handed over the web platform to ENTRENA. In order to manage the web platform and continue with its development, ENTRENA hired an Information and Communication Technology (ICT) Specialist. After June 2015, RTI stopped contributing to the development of the web platform.

Once the ICT Specialist was fully on-board, she conducted an initial analysis of the status of the web platform along with a list of critical tasks that needed immediate attention. One of the most critical problems found in the initial analysis was the coexistence of two database engines: MySQL and CouchDB. Some modules are built using the CouchDB database, while other modules are supported by the MySQL database engine. The mentioned software architectural design was causing ongoing problems and errors on the web platform. Due to shortages in the software architecture, ENTRENA decided to perform a migration of all the information to a unique and centralized database engine: MySQL. This migration was successfully developed and implemented during August-September 2015. The web platform is now more stable, robust, and with a centralized database. The errors reported by our partners have reduced dramatically as a result and have been all but virtually eliminated.

Furthermore, in the reporting period, ENTRENA was able to implement new reports to support the computation of Indicators, update existing reports, and implement the new exit activity form. ENTRENA also performed several critical housekeeping activities such as automating the backing-up process of the MySQL database, upgrading the servers hosted on Amazon AWS, changing beneficiaries from Collateral to Non-Collateral, changing forms from incomplete to complete, and updating beneficiaries' year of birth.

IR 3.2 – Innovative Solutions by Multi-Disciplinary Groups to Reduce Crime

The major component of this IR 3.2 is the creation and eventual replication of a community based crime prevention model which has been established in Los Olivos neighborhood in the sector of Herrera in western Santo Domingo. One of the products of this model is the **Foro of Santo Domingo Oeste.** The process incorporated 55 organizations including state agencies such as the Ayuntamiento del Municipio Santo Domingo West (West Santo Domingo Mayor Office), the Policía Nacional (National Police Department) and the Ministerio de la Juventud (Ministry of Youth), which formed the "Forum for the Prevention of Violence in Santo Domingo West", whose motto is "You are also part of the change, join us".

A coordination team was created comprising six (6) civil society and three (3) governmental institutions which are:

- Alcaldía de Santo Domingo Oeste (ASDO)
- Ministerio de la Juventud (MJ)
- Policía Nacional (PN)
- Confraternidad de Jóvenes Evangélicos

- Casa Comunitaria de Justicia Las Caobas
- Red Comunitaria Nueva Visión
- Fundación Voluntad Educativa
- Asociación de Industriales de Herrera y Provincia Santo Domingo

Addtionally there are five sub committees: a) Education and training, b) Advocacy and communication, c) Territorial Link, d) Planning projects, monitoring and evaluation and e) Finance and logistics.

A total of 83 activities were developed during this project implementation between meetings, workshops and meetings attended by 1,780 people. The *Foro* also organized another series of meetings to present the plan and its achievements and challenges to the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Youth in SDO.

During year 3, the *Foro*, with the support of the PC, produced the following documents, which are key to the success of the operations and sustainability of the pilot:

Rules of engagement and coordination of the Foro

The following three project profiles identified from the plan

Project for the reduction of domestic violence in the Los Olivos neighborhood in the Santo Domingo Oeste municipality

Project for the reduction of dropouts in mid-level (secondary) schools in the Los Olivos neighborhood in the Santo Domingo Oeste municipality

Project to improve the articulation of the civil society organizations in the Los Olivos neighborhood in the Santo Domingo Oeste municipality

The *Foro*, with the support of PC, have completed their violence prevention plan as scheduled

The impact measurement of the first *Foro* of SDO, which looked at qualitative and quantitate factors, was carried out. RTI delivered to Entrena a complete document of analysis of findings, conclusions and recommendations.

The other major product of this model is the Violence Prevention Plan to implement in preselected barrios (neighborhoods) such as Manoguayabo, Las Palmas, Las Caobas and Buenos Aires. This plan has the objective of contributing to the decrease of crime and violence levels in the municipality of western Santo Domingo and improving citizen security and peaceful social coexistence. Channels for follow up and the articulation of public policy are also contemplated at the local level.

The following chart depicts the different components of the violence prevention plan:



Alerta Joven carried out the impact verification for the first *Foro* of the SDO pilot experience through RTI. The following activities were carried out:

The measurement of qualitative factors was conducted during the first week of September 2015 through three workshops organized by PC and with the collaboration of the key actors (e.g., civil society organizations, SDO Municipality, nongovernmental organizations, and members of the Foro coordinating committee). For this workshop, a questionnaire was administered to each participant, which they were to respond to individually. This was followed by a set of eight questions that were asked and discussed in an open group discussion.

As a complement to the qualitative evaluation, the Alerta Joven monitoring and evaluation (M&E) team concluded the intermediate evaluation based on statistical data from the victimization survey in SDO.

Using all the information stated above, RTI presented an evaluation report and a set of recommendations for consolidation of the Pilot in SDO and possible replicas.

IR 3.3 – Support and Advocacy by Public-Private Partnerships (PPPS) for Vulnerable Youth and Children

At the end of Year 3, Alerta Joven has developed the following partnerships:

PPPS Integrating Private Sector and Universities



Messenger Multimedios SRL – A specialized social marketing firm which evolved from the original largest PR and marketing firm in the DR, Young Rubicam, and Damaris, Messenger Multimedios SRL will become the major public relation support behind Alerta Joven. A service agreement has been reached which will bolster the project's path to increased public awareness

and projected sustainability.



The Banco de Reservas and their foundation Fundación BanReserva provides financial support to the youth employment fair for prizes for the

best businesses, and are discussing with Alerta Joven how to create a specialized micro-credit fund for at-risk youth to support entrepreneurship and self-employment. This governmental bank is the largest in the DR and the current administration is focused on expanding the bank's social commitment. Alerta Joven has a significant niche here.

Banco ADEMI is the first Dominican finance organization designed to channel micro-credit to small business. In conjunction with the Asociación de Ahorros y Crédito de La Vega (ALVR) and partner organization UCNE, they are providing credit access to the at-risk youth entrepreneurs trained in the Chilean cooperation model of self-employment.

The **Grupo Ramos**, famous for the large one-stop malls called **La Sirena**, is the **Grupo Ramos** largest single employer in the geographic zone covered by Alerta Joven. This business group provides access for at-risk youth to first time employment and internships through JADOM.



CAPEX (Centro de Innovación y Capacitación Profesional) is the training arm of the Free Zone Industrial Park in Santiago and the Association of Free Zone Businesses in Santiago. CAPEX and Alerta Joven are finalizing an agreement whereby CAPEX will directly recruit at risk youth participants in the poor neighborhoods surrounding their installations to provide first time employment and internships to a target population of 1000 youth in the three most sought after technical skills — industrial diesel mechanics, accounting

assistants, and warehouse assistants. Previously CAPEX had coordinated actions through three partner organizations in Santiago. This new agreement will directly impact their immediate geographic area.

The largest privately owned Dominican bank, **Banco Popular Dominicano**, has credit programs with several implementing partners and was a co-sponsor and cost share provider of the October 2014 EDUCA sponsored APRENDO event focused on youth and employment.



MLB (Major League Baseball) has provided baseball T-shirts to at-risk youth in conflict with the law who participated in two recent studies, and will act as a channel through its Baseball Tomorrow Fund to develop a proposal for the construction of playing fields in the youth detention centers.



UNIBE (Universidad Iberoamericana República Dominicana) and **INTEC** (Instituto Tecnológico de Santo Domingo) are two Dominican universities that carried out research on perceptions of causes of delinquency by adolescents and their neurocognitive profiles. All participants were ages 12-18 currently in conflict with the law and incarcerated in youth detention centers







Both the **Fundación Inicia**, the nonprofit arm of the wealthiest business consortium in the DR and **EDUCA**, the business sector advocacy NGO for education, have partnerships with Entrena in the **NEO** (**New Employment Opportunities**). The NEO receives financing from the IDB (Inter-American Development Bank) with the major goal of improving the quality of the human resource capability and employability levels of 32, 000 youth in the DR. The role of EDUCA is to coordinate the activities and provide technical support to the different organizations and components that make up NEO-DR. The role of Fundación Inicia provides financing for the development of detailed technical profiles for the emerging economic sectors of the Dominican

economy. Entrena will assist with these profiles as well as the development of the "go to" youth friendly webpage. Other **NEO** partners include the Ministry of Education, Ministry of Labor, and Ministry of the Presidency Special Programs (DIGEPEP), National Technical and Professional Training Institute, Ministry of Youth, Business Initiative for Technical Education (IEET), Fundación Sur Futuro, the private Company Implementos y Maquinarias CxA (IMCA) and municipal youth councils.

PPPS Integrating Dominican Governmental Organizations



MEPyD (Ministry of Economy, Planning, and Development) – The corresponding governmental ministry for foreign development assistance in the DR, Alerta Joven, maintains constant communication with the MEPyD. We coordinate directly with the office of the Vice-Minister for International Cooperation, keep them informed of all activities, and coordinate through them with other ministries as necessary.



MINERD (Ministry of Education) – A significant component of Alerta Joven is focused on education with retention and reinsertion programs. Alerta Joven has involved MINERD staff in a variety of activities including training, research, and coordination with local school districts in coordination with the implementing partners



Ministry of Youth – Alerta Joven works with the Ministry of Youth in the areas of public policy and legal framework for youth. As a result of this alliance, the first "user friendly" didactic guide for understanding the General Youth Law 49-00 was developed, as well as the first national guide for youth entrepreneurship.



Ministry of Labor – This ministry provides financing for at-risk youth participants to cover travel costs during the training course on entrepreneurship using the methodology piloted by the Chilean cooperation. It has also collaborated in the development of the first national guide for youth entrepreneurship.



Ministry of Public Health – This alliance is through an agreement with the Department for the Control of Sexually Transmitted Diseases and AIDS (DIGECITTSS) which provides Alerta Joven with technical support and facilitate

materials for training in the prevention workshops developed by the project, including registration and informed consent of youth for HIV testing.



MIC – (Ministry of Industry and Commerce) – This alliance covers collaboration in the development of the first national guide for youth entrepreneurship.



INFOTEP – (National Technical and Professional Training Institute) – A major contributor of Alerta Joven programs, INFOTEP provides the bulk of technical skill and entrepreneurship training through our partners. They provide the facilitators trained in the Chilean model of self-employment who, in turn, will train our youth participants in this model. INFOTEP has also collaborated with

the development of the first national guide for youth entrepreneurship.

PPPS Integrating International Development Organizations



Agencia Internacional de Cooperation Chilena-AGCI (Chilean International Cooperation Agency) and the Fondo de Solidaridad e Inversión Social de Chile

- FOSIS (Chilean Social Investment and Solidarity Fund). The AGCI is the institutional liaison agency with the DR, and FOSIS is the technical counterpart for the Alerta Joven project. Their role is to train certified instructors from INFOTEP who then train 1,284 at-risk youth participants from Boca Chica

through Alerta Joven partner Caminantes, and in San Francisco de Macoris through partner UCNE.



United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) - Alerta Joven has received significant support from the UNFPA, which supported follow up studies, recommendations, and a road map for future actions for the first National

Youth Forum celebrated in September 2013. UNPHA has provided support for National Youth Day activities, has underwritten printing costs for the youth entrepreneurship guide, and spearheaded a campaign to reduce adolescent pregnancies.



Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) – The bank through its FOMIN department provides the external financing for the NEO-DR alliance of which Alerta Joven is a member.

VI. GOING FORWARD - CHALLENGES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

The last annual report (Year 2) identified five challenges: (1) Web platform and tracking system (2) Diversity of our implementing partners (3) Working with our donor USAID (4) Working with the Dominican government, and (5) Fostering long-term sustainability. What follows is a description of progress made during year 3 in these challenges and the inclusion of a new one – creating synergy with USAID partners.

Web Platform and Information System

As discussed in the section of this report for Intermediate Result 3.1, significant progress was made on the WEB platform over the course of the recent year of the Alerta Joven Project (October 2014 – September 2015). The most important improvement over this period was the increased stability and robustness of the WEB platform which has positively impacted the project by increasing the level of trust among our partners and also the quality of the data. The new Entrena staff person for the position of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) Specialist seamlessly managed the transfer of the system from RTI to Entrena.

Partner Organizations

Significant time, energy, and resources were devoted by Entrena during year 3 to upgrade the performance of 21 implementing partners for Alerta Joven. RTI was excluded from this activity since their role is specifically confined to the tracking system and M&E. This process included full day evaluation meetings and workshops for each partner focusing on reaching targets, quality interventions, and overall management. A performance ranking system was developed grading the capability of each partner in the following areas:

Results from the performance review were the following:

Excellent (90-100 points) – Total of 4 partners: DREAM, IDDI, Children International Santo Domingo East, Fundacion Pediátrica por un Mañana.

Good (80-90 points) – Total of 6 partners: Caritas, Profamilia, Casa Abierta, JADOM, Sur Futuro, Children International Boca Chica

Satisfactory – (70-80 points) – Total of 3 partners: UCNE, ACOPRO, Acción Callejera Not Satisfactory – (Below 70 points) – Total of 8 partners: CEPROSH, MOSTCHA, Grupo Clara, CEFASA, Caminante, Project Hope, CSA, COIN

Please note that this scale should not be used in a comparative nature. Challenges, levels of risk, high crime areas, "tough" neighborhoods, and other factors vary between sub-agreements so we should avoid comparing apples with oranges. Nevertheless, the performance evaluation gave each partner a clear snapshot of where they stand and what needs to be improved. Each organization was provided feedback and action plans for improvement, regardless of their score. In the case of COIN and Grupo Clara, their sub-agreements were rescinded and target groups assumed by other partners.

Entrena also increased field visits and oversight, provided additional teams of providers to enter data in the tracking system, and assigned 9 employment insertion specialists for each province of the project. This investment coupled with the feedback to the partners produced the results we were striving for – quality improved, targets were reached, and participants were registered. The celebration of these achievements was shared by all at the year 3 convention of Alerta Joven from July 29-31, 2015. We can affirm that by the end of year 3, we achieved the levels of productivity from our partners that met our original expectations.

Working with Our Donor

Year 3 also witnessed improved coordination with our donor. Communications, approvals, concurrences, coordination with field and public events, anticipating technical and financial modifications, and overall troubleshooting were managed expeditiously. At the end of year 3, USAID has received the final budget realignments and revised Program Description for Alerta Joven, whose approval we expect during the first quarter of Year 4. We express our gratitude to the USAID team for their support, guidance, and commitment with the goals of Alerta Joven.

Working with the Dominican Government

There has been little change in this area since the last report for Year 2. The only difference is that the country is heading into an electoral campaign culminating in May 2016 which will probably produce increased government lethargy for coordination of actions. We continue to work with the seven ministries with whom we have signed agreements and in the case of the larger entities such as MINERD, with a multiplicity of departments and school districts. Plans continue to include following up on meetings with the Ministry of the Presidency; continuing coordination with Ministry of Economy, Planning and Development; deepening a productive relationship with the National Attorney General office and strengthening recent productive relationships with the Ministry of Education. However, we realize our expectations are tempered by the strong personalization and weak institutionalization of the GoDR institutions.

Sustainability

The model for long-term sustainability proposed in the Alerta Joven program description is an eventual co-financing mechanism with financial support from the government and private sector, but with operational autonomy. This continues to be the model, but how we get there has been tempered by our experience during the first three years. Alerta Joven undoubtedly has a clear competitive niche — solutions for at-risk youth who are one step away from potential delinquency and violence, which is the number one issue for Dominican society today. Yet we are aware that any relationship with the Dominican government, especially one that has financial support underpinnings, can easily disappear in one decree. The challenges posed by the political need for the government to be an implementer of activities versus an enabler of actions by society seem unlikely to change. Achievements during year 3 include the following:

Developed strategy with Messenger Multimedios SRL for social marketing campaign to support sustainability.

Design of Year 4 work plan for sustainability with eight specific tasks to be completed by 5/31/16.

Synergies between USAID Partners

USAID carried out a two day workshop on September 2-3, 2015 to promote synergies between partners. Alerta Joven has identified three specific areas to create synergies with other partners. These are improved reading skills and safe schools, climate change, and local crime prevention networks.

"Barrio" - Refers to urban slum areas in the Dominican Republic. These are the areas targeted in the Alerta Joven project.


"Charlas"- Refers to informal speaking presentations led by community leaders or trained specialists in a conversational style.


ATTACHMENT 1: GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION





PROYECTO ALERTA JOVEN

Espacio para Crecer (EpC) Model

Alerta Joven uses the EpC model as the major tool for achieving educational goals in school retention and re-insertion. EpC provides our at-risk adolescents from ages 11 to 14 the opportunity to improve academic skills, acquire social skills, and achieve levels of personal growth and self-esteem. This helps them to remain in school, avoid over-aging in the classroom, and, in the case of being out of school, provides a channel for mainstreaming them back into school. This is critical since there is a direct relationship between dropping out of school during grades 5-7 and initiation in delinquency. As of 9/30/14, Alerta Joven had registered a total of 1,598 participants in this model. The following provides background information about EpC and its successful application in other countries.



The EpC model was created in 2004 as an educational initiative (USDOL funding) to eliminate the worst forms of child labor in the Dominican Republic. Over 11,000 children ages 6-13 successfully completed the program by 2010 measured by reinsertion in school, at-risk students staying in school, grade advancement, and reduction of overaged students. In the DR and later in Colombia, the EpC became a learning revolution and viable low-cost solution for

creating a full school day. Content incorporates national school curriculum. The EpC has three important components: personal growth, social skills, and academic support, and can be a 3 hour before or after school program. Success indicators are attendance, academic success, parent, family and community involvement, and personal growth. The EpC uses Quantum Learning © (QL) methodology which promotes the idea that learning is natural and every student is gifted. As of September 2014, the EpC has been successfully implemented in the Dominican Republic, Colombia, Nicaragua, Panama, and Ecuador.

The EpC model has received important recognition and awards; including being one of the 30 finalists in the WISE 2010 Awards for Educational Innovation and being internationally acclaimed

by Sen. Tom Harkin in his June 2009 address to the 98th session of the International Labor Conference by the following quote"

Wellington Sánchez is the facilitator in the Space for Growth or "Espacio Para Crecer" (EpC) located in the Santa Ana grade school in San Francisco de Macorís. Wellington, starting his third year as an EpC facilitator is a role model for his fellow facilitators due to his dedication, responsibility, creativity, dynamism and outstanding performance in his work with the boys and girls in his EpC. The results speak for themselves; Jorden de la Cruz was stuck in third grade, having failed pass on to fourth grade. After only three months of attendance in the Santa Ana EpC, Jordan improved his reading and writing skills enough to be promoted up to fourth grade in midterm. Another example is Ángel Gabriel Correa, identified as a youth at risk due to his constant disruptive behavior in and out of the classroom. After attending the EpC, Angel won the Meritorius Student Award due to his improved behavior and academic achievement. The school's principal, Francisca Joaquín attributes this change to Wellington and is great full for the help that the EpC program has brought to this education center.

The EpC is innovative due to its low cost, community insertion and empowerment, use of a highly engaging methodology which accelerates learning, and is totally integrated with the public school system and connected to the daily school day of a child. It is relevant because it serves marginalized populations unable to access quality reading and math programs, leverages and consolidates community resources currently under-utilized, and has strong potential for rapid replication and expansion.

EpC demonatrates that personal growth develops self-image in adolescents and children, which is vital in unleashing their learning potential. When a child gains confidence in his/her abilty to read and understand numbers, the sky is the limit. We observed how social skills were formed through recreational reading. Reading in groups, friendly reading competitions, and reading out loud all promote socialization patterns that promote teamwork, caring, and solidarity, especially in environments where all learning is celebrated. This carries over to family and immediate community where anger and violence is replaced by dialogue. Academic support was provided through language and reading skills. Participants quickly connected their improved performances in the classroom with their extra curricular activities.

Fours key indicators underscore the EpC model. The first indicator is attendance: adolescents and children regularly attend both the EpC as well as school, with enthusiasm and on time! The second indicator is academic success: participants achieved higher grades in school and were promoted to the next grade during the school year. The third indicator has been parent, family and community involvement: they see how their children were changing, thereby changing themselves, becoming more engaged with their children's education. Community leaders volunteered time, goods and services and communities become more empowered with their local schools. A fourth indicator, and perhaps the one where we will see the most success, is at a personal level: Participants started to enjoy learning, unwraping their potential to continue

learning, and made education and personal growth their top priority at this time in their lives. They acquired the confidence and social skills to successfully continue on with school.

The EpC model uses an "asset-based" approach to development, focusing on what works instead of being problem-oriented. EpC shows how a highly structured and scripted program can function in an unstructured situation. The EpC model is sustainable, low-cost, low-tech, applicable in any setting (rural, urban, slum) and requires only very basic infrastructure.

The quality of learning in the EpC model is anchored in the Quantum Learning methodology and relevant content. QL has evolved from the best educational practices including accelerated learning, multiple intelligences, experiential learning, cooperative learning, elements of effective instruction, and brain-compatible learning. All EpC participants receive text/workbooks, facilitators receive guides, and instruction is completely orchestrated, scripted, and sequenced into a four-hour class plan in which "everything speaks, everything has a purpose, and all learning is celebrated."

ATTACHMENT 7

THE IMPACT OF THE EpC PROGRAM ON SCHOOL RETENTION AND ACADEMIC SKILLS IMPROVEMENTS



Spaces for Growth (Espacios para Crecer -EpC) is an educational program for children between the ages of 6 and 15 based upon the methodology of Quantum Learning. The program is structured in daily lessons of 3 hours for 10 months. The program focuses on three areas: academic, personal and recreation. All three areas have the same level of importance in order to provide integrated development with balance between academic knowledge and concepts, personal experiences and the need for recreation by the participating boys, girls and adolescents. The spaces are managed by facilitators trained in the Quantum Learning methodology. These facilitators are selected from the communities in the impact zones of Alerta Joven. Each EpC is equipped with didactic materials such as work books and facilitator manuals.

In the project framework, this program is aimed at youth between the ages of 11 to 14, demonstrating a high risk potential for dropping out of school or who have already dropped out of school. For youth with a high potential for dropping out of school, the program objective is to keep participants in school, while the objective for children who have already dropped out, the program serves as a trampoline towards school re-insertion. As such, the EpC program can address both the education retention and insertion indicators.

The following report summarizes academic results of youth completing the EpC program in the following areas: attendance percentages in the EpCs, percentage of participants promoted to the next grade at the end of the school year, the percentage of participants held back to repeat the same grade at the end of the school year, and the average academic achievement scores by subject, grade, gender and age.

Report Methodology

The EpC program is being implemented by 12 Alerta Joven partner organizations with a total of 152 Spaces with a capacity of 30 youth per space. The EpCs for the 2014-15 school year initiated services for the youth in October and finished in May for an average of 8 months of service.

Each partner organization was asked to collect and submit the data on the assistance and academic achievement of their youth in the EpC program. Eight partner organizations responded to the request within the required time frame. The academic results were obtained from the schools in which the youth were enrolled. For this report, the participant names from the academic reports were cross checked with the digital data base to insure that the youth were indeed enrolled and had attended the EpC program. Table 1 shows the distribution by organization of EpC students for this analysis.

The academic scores were digitalized into an Excel data base by a team of two auxiliary data entry personnel contracted by Entrena. A total of 1,353 cases were processed into the data base. The Monitoring & Evaluation department confirmed that these names were in the Alerta Joven web based data platform and had at least one recorded attendance in the EpC program. 50% of the academic scores sent by the partner organizations are from Epc participants with at least one recorded attendance.

Results

Of the 735 youth enrolled in EpCs, 56% are male and 44% female. This contrasts with enrollment percentages in Dominican public schools where female enrollment tends to make up slightly more than 50% of the student population. Participants ranged in age from 6 to 19, however 89% of the data sample are from 11 to 14 years old.

The number of services received ranges from just one recorded attendance to over 20 events attended and recorded in the data platform. The average attendance in the data base is 16 during the EpC school year. EpC attendance should be entered into the system once per month per participant regardless of the number of activities (camps, meetings, workshops, etc.) that they may have participated in during that month.

Upon entering the EpC program, 69% of the beneficiaries were enrolled grades fourth through eighth. We were unable to determine the grade level of 26% the participants as this data was not included in academic results submitted by the schools. The average grade level of the beneficiaries was sixth. 34.7% of the participants attended school in the morning and 35.1% in the afternoon. The hours of school attendance for the remaining 30.2% was not identified.

Attendance and Academic Achievement

Attendance and promotion to the next grade at the end of the school year was high for EpC participants with average attendance of 92% and promotion at 93.6%. The average academic achievement was 77 for all EpC beneficiaries and 78 for those that were promoted. 5.5% of EpC participants were held back and not promoted to the next grade. They will repeat the same grade in the next school year. These

participants had an average score of 63. Table 2 breaks down academic scores for each semester and the year-end final score.

Academic achievement data was also submitted for the four principal subjects, math, Spanish, Social Sciences and Natural Sciences. Score averages are similar across all the subjects with the highest average scores occurring in social and natural sciences. In analyzing the data of participants that were promoted, we find the minimal score of 67, the high at 97 and the average score of 77 points. Table 3 summarizes these scores for each subject by semester.

In conclusion the data demonstrates that Spaces for Growth participants have stayed in school and that over 94% were promoted the next grade at the end of the school year.

The Advantages of Staying In School (LVPE)



The Advantages of Staying in School (LVPE – Las Ventajas de Permanecer en la Escuela) program is designed to demonstrate to students in the 8th grade and students in the first and second year of high school the importance and value of education. Through the ASIS program participants are brought to realize how formal education and staying in school provides them with the skills they need for personal and professional development. In the ASIS program, students discover the life altering implications that can occur if they leave school. The program includes activates that helps students recognize and develop their individual talents and preferences and gives them tools to help them make decisions as they plan for the future, with an overall result of increasing the motivation of participants to stay in school and complete their formal education. The program consists of five modules (60 minutes each one)

Module 1:"The Road to Personal Realization" - This module introduces participants to the concept of personal realization and education as medium to acquire the tools needed to increase future employment opportunities. The students play a board game where they make common lifestyle choices and see the consequences of those decisions.

Module 2:"Th e Advantages of Staying In School" - In this module, the students work in teams with the objective to analyze the education system of the Dominican Republic. Within this analysis they will discuss the current situation and compare it with the employment needs in the country as it relates to their own level or grade of academic advancement.

Module 3: "The Cost of Deserting School" - In this module the student reviews how completing education through high school and beyond can provide the skills and tools needed to increase the possibility of employment. The methodology includes having the students look at the "Help Wanted" advertisements of daily newspapers and calculate the salary levels of these jobs. With this information the students prepare personal budgets with the expenses they would incur as independent adults.

Módulo 4: "Confronting Our Problems" - This module has the students dramatize different situations that could lead a student to drop out of school. This methodology allows the participants to express their feelings and thoughts when confronting difficult situations. The activity concludes with each student writing a letter to friend explaining the advantages of staying in school.

Module 5: "Projecting into the Future" - The students review the main concepts from the previous modules. They explore their skills and interests within the context of projecting themselves into the future. They are asked to choose a profession or job that they would like to have and develop a plan to achieve this goal. This module also reviews the components of a successful employment interview coupled with simulations of an actual interview.

This school retention program is managed by our new partner Junior Achievement Dominicana (JADOM), an organization with established links to the Dominican private sector. LVPE is strategically important to Alerta Joven because it uses an educational platform within the public school linked to future employment insertion. This model will reach 7,674 participants enrolled in primary and secondary schools.

Thirteen partner organizations started LVPE under the coordination of JADOM in April 2015 with a total of 4,968 students representing 69% of the goal. The full goal should be achieved by the end of semester of the 2015 - 2016 school year.

Sexual and reproductive health is one of the areas which present some of the highest levels of risk in youth in the Dominican Republic, which manifests itself through high adolescent pregnancy rates. Alerta Joven participant surveys to date present the following data regarding sexual health practices:

The sub segment of homeless youth demonstrates even higher risk levels in the area of sexual and reproductive health. The Alerta Joven participant survey includes 39,674 youth between the agers of 11 to 18 of which 1408 do not attend school. Survey results indicate a higher percentage of adolescent pregnancy with youth who do not attend school. Several studies indicate that youth in this sub segment have lower awareness levels of birth control methods and proper use of condoms coupled with increased negative responses when asked about their willingness to use these methods. This sub segment also tends to have more frequent use of drugs. All of these factors raise the risk for unplanned pregnancy and exposure to STDs/HIV/Aids.

The health program of Alerta Joven was focused specifically on sexual and reproductive health in order to reduce unplanned pregnancy and the presence of STDs/HIV/Aids in youth between the ages of 11 to 24 in marginalized communities using evidence based approach. A sub component of this program sought to increase the conceptual capabilities of the people who work in these

thematic areas with the final results being improved skills and abilities when providing sexual health services for high risk youth.

The specific interventions in this sub component were developed following a needs assessment of youth leaders and key beneficiaries of the partner organizations. This needs assessment helped identify which innovative interventions would be most useful to obtain project goals and to insure that the training was adapted to the needs of partner organization personnel. Based upon the assessment findings, training included the following segments:

- Applying evidenced based practices when working with adolescents using levels 1 and 2 of the Transteórico Model of behavior change, risk reduction and motivational interviews.
- Supervisor Workshops for applying evidenced based practices using the Transteórico Model of behavior change.
- Train the trainer workshop on evidence based models for approaching youth and adolescents with motivational interview techniques.

All the training workshops followed adult learning principals. The principal methodology used was the "Existential Learning Cycle" where participants would share and process their personal experiences in order to apply the new techniques to their "real life" situations.

The training was supported by visits to the partner organizations; Children International, Instituto Dominicano de Desarrollo Integral, Inc. (IDDI) and Asociación pro Bienestar de la Familia (PROFAMILIA) from the global director of CAI New York, local office personnel and Alerta Joven staff. These visits included interviews and focus groups with partner organization staffs. This follow-up insured the implementation and systematization of evidenced based practices. The partner organization staffs were questioned as to changes and observations following the implementation of the CICATELLI methodologies with the following responses:

- > Improved counseling techniques, with counseling more focused on risk reduction.
- Greater rapprochement between partner organization staff and management
- Improved communication between working groups.
- Structural changes at the institutional level of the partner organizations.
- Increased integration of organization personnel
- Increase in the amount services to youth.
- Positive attitude changes towards work.
- Improved communication between staff.

The partner organizations provided several examples of strategy changes following the CICATELLI workshops.

IDDI had previously divided their youth volunteers into working groups by function as facilitators, mediators or multipliers, with each group using a different methodology. Following the workshops, all the groups began to utilize the motivational interview and behavior change methodology and in effect became one group of facilitators. This new structure increased and

integrated more actions by the volunteer and paid staffs working with youth and optimized economic and human resources for the organization.

In Profamlia, the staff and volunteer multipliers offered birth control methods directly to participating youth without taking into account the level or stage that the participant was in. (Was the participant really prepared to abandon high risk lifestyles and adapt new ones?) Following the CICATELLI workshops, the staff evaluates the stage of the participating youth (Pre-contemplation, Contemplation, Preparation, Action, Relapse, and Sustainable Change) in terms of their willingness and ability to initiate behavior change before suggesting birth control methods. These changes are now being replicated throughout the organization.

A full analysis and report of the results of the workshops will be presented by CICATELLI in the month of November 2015.

A PROSPECTIVE SURVEY ON TECHNICAL AND PROFESSIONAL TRAINING AND EDUCATIONAL DEMANDS IN THE DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

Santo Domingo, D. N August 2015 According to the National Labor Force Survey of 2014, the economically active population (PEA) totaled 4.9 million people. Of that total, 976,000, equivalent to 20%, were between the ages of 16 and 24 years. In this young PEA group (16 y 24 year olds), 29% (close to 282,000 people) are unemployed equivalent to twice the rate of the total active population, which is 14.5% (expanded rate).

This study is a contribution to the provisions of the "National Pact for Education Reform 2014 2030" on what to do with education and professional technical training, and also aims to provide reference information for the design of training policies and training of human resources to meet the demands in occupational performance areas that require technical skills of a specific nature.

General objective:

Measure the demand for present and projected, technical-professional qualifications in the formal employment sector for the purpose of improving the design of public policies for Technical Education and Vocational Training in basic and middle levels of the occupational pyramid.

Specific objectives:

- 1. Establish general characteristics for occupational profiles requiring specific technical training in basic and middle levels of the occupational pyramid.
- 2. Estimate the number of job vacancies or need of employment of technical nature on a national scale.
- 3. Estimate the demand for technical profiles by sector, branch of activity, performance areas and occupational fields.
- 4. Establish the level of difficulty for employers to fill vacancies requiring profiles of a technical nature.
- 5. Estimate the length of the learning curve for new employees once they enter available jobs at companies.
- 6. Examine the expectations of creating new jobs or jobs of a technical nature during the next six years, according to industry branch, occupational areas and fields.
- 7. Establish assessment guidelines for the employer sector in training programs and /or training institutions.
- 8. Examine the available programs to educate and train technicians in occupational fields and areas in high demand.

Target Objective No.1: "Estimate the number of job openings of a technical nature e at the national level".

Conclusion: Based on the ENFT 2014, of the 4.2 million employed (formal and informal employment), we have estimated at 2.7 million, the number of people in employment positions, which require professional qualification

Target Objective No.2: "Establish the general characteristics of career profiles, requiring specific technical training, at both base and mid-level of the occupational pyramid.

Conclusion: Most employers require that formal candidates for jobs in the basic and middle levels of the occupational pyramid, have at the very least, a high school education. A little over 60% confirm this. Similarly, about 20% on average require they have specific technical training.

Among the most important transversal key skills for employers are included "Teamwork" and "Oral and Written Communication skills". Of those surveyed, 48% and 43%, respectively, will reflect this.

Target Objective No.3: Estimate the demand for technical profiles by considered; sector, branch of activity, performance areas, occupational areas and fields. "

Conclusion: Given the estimated current demand and what is projected for the next six years (2020). The entities involved in providing vocational and technical training, can use the information in the report to revise its offer and making relevant adjustments (see Annex 1 of this excerpt, in which growth estimates by occupational fields are specified until 2020)

Target Objective No.4: "Establish the challenges faced by employers when hiring profiles requiring a technical nature".

Conclusion: Challenges vary by performance and occupational areas; however, in those where the functions and tasks to be performed require specific skills related to the command of "hard" technology (the areas of Natural Sciences, Applied and related occupations, processing, manufacturing and assembly, and Occupations requiring Equipment and transportation), a little over 70% of those employers surveyed, who have positions in these areas, say they confront serious challenges finding candidates with the desired profiles in the current labor market. Occupational areas in which employers reported facing challenges when hiring, 100%, of the time, according to the survey, are: Occupations in the area of construction, Mechanical Equipment and Heavy Machinery, Stationary Machine Operators, Printing Machine Operators, Electrical and Electronics Technicians.

Target Objective No.5: "Estimate the length of the learning curve for new employees once they enter the jobs available in companies".

Conclusion: Duration varies according to occupational areas; however, 46% of employers said that on average, learning lasted three months, 16% two months, and 31%, only a month.

Target Objective No.6: Forecast the creation of new positions of a technical nature during the next five years, according to industry, occupational areas and fields

Conclusion:

The Performance areas "Sales and Services", "Finance and Administration" and "Processing, Manufacturing and Assembly" are those with the greater number of available jobs. A detailed examination of occupations related to occupational areas included in those areas of performance is available in the report, and may be considered useful by organizations with a common interest in education, training and job placement.

Target Objective No.7: "Examine the educational and training provisions available to technicians for the occupational fields and areas in rising demand."

Conclusion: (1) The available technical-professional training (for young people with expectations of entering the labor market at an early age), is led by the Ministry of Education and INFOTEP. (2) PTE figures for middle and upper level indicate that the amount of available education is somewhat limited given the magnitude of the estimated demands, especially those associated with occupational areas in hard technologies (3)Meanwhile INFOTEP plays an important role, especially in providing training for employed and unemployed people. Their contribution covers roughly about 27% of the demand for continuous training for the employed population.

RECOMENDATIONS

- 1. Elevate the level of schooling for young people who are not in the educational system, so that they can complete high school and meet the growing demand of employers ,who require candidates who possess skills and knowledge acquired through a secondary education
- 2. Government agencies should identify young people in vulnerable situations or at risk, and along with non-governmental organizations identify and reintegrate those who are outside the formal and non-formal education circuits.
- 3. The entities involved in technical and vocational education and training, require a thorough review of current of market demands in order adjust their curriculums accordingly, with occupational fields and areas in highest demand.
- 4. The study has highlighted the imminent need the country has for a National Dictionary of Occupations (DNO), a National Qualifications Catalogue (NCC) and to jumpstart the projected National Qualifications Framework (NQF). The MNC would solve major pitfalls related to the organization of the portfolio of secondary, higher education and vocational training. MINERD has taken important steps for the conceptualization of an MNC.
- 5. Also necessary for the development of these instruments, is coordination between public and private institutions involved with labor issues, employment regulations, regulations of vocational training and higher levels of education and the guidelines for formal and non formal education.
- 6. The balance of the relationship between the demand for training and available training reveals the need for greater coordination, not only on the basis of global or sectorial studies conducted from time to time, but also based on consensus and permanent implementation of mechanisms like recordkeeping, monitoring and systematic assessment of demand and supply of education

- and training. There have been initiatives in this direction, which should to be evaluated in an institutional manner and assigned a budget to assure continuity.
- 7. One of the contributions of this study is its benchmark for determining demand; In this regard the International Standard Classification of Occupations (ISCO-2008 ILO). It is recommended that future studies take their occupational structure from the National Dictionary of Occupations and this classification, to achieve international comparability.
- 8. Seek a balance in the availability for Vocational Technical Education. Of all the training available, MINERD concentrates 70% of its training in the Service sector, 25%, to the Industrial Sector, but only 5% to the Agricultural sector, and in the Mining sector, only 0.02%.
- 9. In terms of technical training, it is a bit more balanced, with new training available in the Agricultural Area (14%), Industrial Area (38%) and services (48%). We should ensure these areas with the necessary technological provisions to meet their demands.

FOSIS MODEL: Employment Insertion for Vulnerable Youth Promotion Program (Programa de Promoción para la inserción laboral para jóvenes en situación de vulnerabilidad en la República Dominicana)

The Chilean Agency for International Cooperation (AGCI), the United States Agency for International Development International (USAID) and the Dominican Ministry of Economics, Planning and Development (MEPyD) signed a three party agreement with the objective of supporting the integration of vulnerable youth into the labor market through salaried employment or self-employment. This program takes place in Boca Chica and San Francisco de Macorís and benefits 1,280 youth between the ages of 15 and 24. It is a two year project with the implementation taking place from 2015 through 2016.

The program is implemented by Entrena through the Alerta Joven Project, the National Institute for Technical Professional Formation and the Dominican Ministry of Labor. The Chilean Solidarity and Investment Fund (Fondo de Solidaridad e Inversión - FOSIS) provides technical support.

The 80 hour program, entitled "Entrepreneurship and Employability" contains 4 modules: 16 hours of life skills, 16 hours employability, 40 hours of entrepreneurship, and 8 hours of practical applications. The Entrepreneurship component is based upon the methodologies CEFE and the Canvas Business Model. FOSIS has extensive experience applying these methodologies for employment and entrepreneurship with the poor and other vulnerable populations.

FOSIS Program Results as of September, 30, 2105:

632 youth are taking part in training programs, representing 49% of the original goal.

44 facilitators have been trained and certified by INFOTEP in the CEFE methodologies used in FOSIS.

262 youth have graduated the Entrepreneurship and Employability Course.

44 business plans generated through the course took part in regional self-employment and entrepreneurship fairs.

17 business plans generated through the course took part in the National Self-employment and Entrepreneurship Fair.

3 business plans generated through the course were awarded prizes, including the first prize winner at the National Self-employment and Entrepreneurship Fair.

3 micro businesses are development phase with seed capital of RD\$125, 000.00.

33 businesses have been contacted to provide apprenticeships or employment insertion opportunities for program graduates.

46 youth have completed apprenticeship programs or have obtained a new or better job.

Public / Private agreements have been signed with the Chamber of Commerce in the Province de Duarte and the San Francisco de Macorís Regional Office of the Ministry of Education to support employment insertion.

Based upon the successes of this program in 2015 in the original target communities, Alerta Joven has decided to replicate it throughout all the geographical zones of the project. Alerta Joven will train new facilitators in November, 2015. This facilitator will begin to implement the FOSIS model in January, 2016

From Stress to a new Jerica

Jerica is the firstborn of five brothers and sisters that her mom had with 3 different men. She lives in Pantoja – Herrera, a high risk zone with her father. Jerica is not sexually active.

Jerica came to the Alerta Joven program through the Fundación Pediátrica por un Mañana (FPUM) in order to continue her studies, to reduce her stress and discomfort due to frequent communication problems with her father. She was so afraid to talk to her father that every morning she waits until he leaves the house before getting out of bed.

After a clinical interview Alerta Joven – FPUM counselors identified Jerica's stress generators: her

father and home environment. Since moving in with him and his new wife, he would constantly assault her physically and verbally. Living with a new family was extremely stressful for this young girl and this manifested itself in unsafe or disruptive behaviors such as: not locking the door after leaving her house, not bringing her keys with her when she goes out to run errands and having frequent fights with friends.

Once the stress generators, risk factors and circle of violence were identified, Alerta Joven – FPUM provided educational and psychological counselling for Jerica, validating her, encouraging her and reinforcing her self-esteem. She developed a personal life plan based on personal integrity, family values, and education.

Later, her mother also came to the center to get therapeutic help. The mother has met the father to discuss the situation and he has agreed to help Jerica economically. Jerica is now living in Villa Altagracia with her mother and returns three days a week to FPUM for follow-up. Jerica has completed a baking course and is now enrolled in a candle making course.

"Turning the full circle"

This story is one of the most successful for the Alerta Joven - DREAM Project. Javier, 18 years old, began the program "A Ganar" with no professional experience.

He studied hard in an English school in the community to reach a high level of English as he always knew that this language would open doors to success in Cabarete.

Although a shy student when he started this program which fosters life and employability skills, Javier was a motivated and active participant in the course.

After completing the employability component of the course, he found a job washing dishes at the restaurant "Los Gringos", a famous place on the beach of Cabarete.

Shortly thereafter, Javier was promoted from washing dishes to kitchen assistant, and later to waiter. He graduated from A Ganar in December 2014 and only six months later, he was put in charge of the restaurant and bar.

The restaurant expanded with a second location in Sosua and Javier was promoted to manage it with an excellent salary. There he was able to work with three other A Ganar graduates.

By June, 2015 things have turned full circle as Javier contacted DREAM Project to request two more employees from the Alerta Joven – A Ganar program.

Jimmy: "Now I legally exist"

"Bateyes" communities that originated with sugar cane workers face multiple development challenges. Health and education levels are significantly below the national average while poverty is far above the national level. As an example, 30% of children over 10 years living in these communities are illiterate, three times over the national average of 11%. Secondary school attendance is limited due to several difficulties including the lack of birth certificates or other identification documents to complete enrollment requirements beyond the eighth grade. Approximately 22% of "batey" residents are undocumented.

Alerta Joven has partnered with Community Service Alliance (CSA) to provide an integrated program for youth at risk in Batey Lecheria in northwestern Santo Domingo which includes: documentation, educational support, health services, vocational training and assistance for employment insertion. The program currently serves more than 1,000 young people in Batey Lecheria and its surrounding communities.

CSA with additional support from Centro Bonó has helped more than 50 participants to obtain their legal documentation.

Jimmy, a young man of 18 from Batey Lechería, spoke about how Alerta Joven has helped him obtain legal documentation.

Jimmy proudly presented his identity card and stated: "Before entering the project I did not know how to get my documents and had no money to pay for the process. Alerta Joven helped me with resources and guided me through the process". Jimmy has received vocational training, giving him more options to improve the quality of his life and progress towards a brighter future.

The influence of friends in the lives of young people is strong. Gravidelvis Paulino Mercedes, 16 years old from the community of Los Grullón in San Francisco de Macoris, is a confirmation of this statement.

Prior to being part of Alerta Joven, he joined a gang motivated by close friends that were always pushing him to come into crime, but once he was there, they told him he could not leave. "When I entered into the gang I immediately regretted it; the lifestyle of the gang I don't wish it for anyone", said Gravidelvis.

He joined Alerta Joven motivated by the multifaceted activities developed by Profamilia with their volunteers. Gravidelvis is now one of them as part of the METI Team,

(*Multiplicadores de Espacios Informales*) promoting HIV/AIDS prevention and the correct use of condoms in local – informal businesses.

"Before I came to Alerta Joven I was an antisocial, had many behavioral problems and my sex life was problematic: I had sex almost with anyone, and had multiple partners, I did not think about prevention. Once I joined this project I have changed, I only have sex with a condom and I have only one partner", he added.

Gravidelvis Paulino now has a plan for his life and is focused on three goals: enter into college, work to buy a house for his mother and continue working as a volunteer in benefit of his community bringing information on sex rights and HIV prevention.

At the end of September 2015, Alerta Joven partner Dream Project celebrated the graduation of 29 young men and woman youth from its highly successful "A Ganar" youth employment program.

During the ceremony, graduate Paulino Africa Joseph asked to speak some impromptu words of thanks.

The 21 year old Paulino told the group, "I had been out of work for over a year when I started A Ganar. Not long after we finished the course, I submitted my resume to a business".

They called me for an interview and a friend said, "Write down what you are going to say so you don't mess up." I replied, "No I have been preparing for this for over six

months." I went to the interview and when it was over the manager told me I could leave now. I thought to myself, "I must have messed something up."

But before I left the building, they called me back and asked if I had a change of clothes. I said, "I am always ready". They responded, "Good because you've got the job and you can start right now." I am now working for this company in Sosua.

Paulino lives in the barrio of Sabaneta de Cangrejos in Sosua and helps support his mother and siblings with the money he earns. He was recognized by Dream Project for his leadership skills and was chosen by them to represent Sosua youth in the Youth Empowerment in Public Policy Forum conducted by CEPROSH in September, 2015 with Alerta Joven sponsorship.

"A genuine entrepreneur founded"

It is usually hard to identify a young entrepreneur, but in the case of Roberto Tolentino (22 years old) we realized it at the first glance. This young man stood out from the beginning, offering great ideas that described his business plan and in turn helped him to take full advantage of the course content.

It was almost by chance that Tolentino enrolled in a course of entrepreneurship and employability held by Alerta Joven / Caminante. He didn't know what it was all about, but he was motivated to attend. As the course progressed, he became more involved in the processes, his interest grew each day and he realized that he had the personality of an entrepreneur.



Tolentino's challenge was to identify the perfect business that would satisfy needs and permit him to achieve success in his community, barrio Monte Adentro, which is located in Andres – Boca Chica, a touristic destination rich in resources, but extremely poor in the quality of life of its habitants.

After completing a field study, he came upon a simple idea that would fill a need in his community, an office supply store and cafeteria. He prepared and presented his business plan and was chosen to participate in the first Self Employment and Entrepreneurship Fair.

Tolentino won second prize at the fair with a good presentation that demonstrated to the judges the soundness of his business plan. He is now putting his business plan into action using his home and with the support of his family, especially his mother.

His experience has served him well at his young age and has made him a young entrepreneur in his community. His example serves as an inspiration of other youth who have dreams, but up till now do not take the risk to begin.





On Saturday, February 21 the young volunteers performed various tasks to support FPUM including: assembling cribs, painting, organizing the kitchen area, and repairing the recreation area. The FPUM a partner organization in the Alerta Joven Project, funded by the US Agency for International Development (USAID) and implemented by Entrena SRL.

FPUM signed the agreement with Entrena to implement Alerta Joven in Herrera and Santo Domingo Oeste. The foundations works with pregnant teenagers and young mothers aged from 11 to 24. They provide educational services that help these young women to finish high school in collaboration with CENAPEC. With the support of INFOTEP, they also offer technical-vocational courses such as: pharmacy assistant, cooking, hardware store assistant, and manufacture of home cleaning supplies.

In addition young women and their families enrolled in the program will receive counseling and spiritual support to address the issues that led to early or unplanned pregnancies.

As of March 23, 2015, DREAM Project has 220 direct participants enrolled in Alerta Joven. 77 participants take part in A Ganar (35%) with the remainder enrolled in education retention programs. The DREAM sub-agreement was approved in September, 2014.

There they met with Sister Nieves, who gave them an overview of the center's program to rescue women and young girls from prostitution in Haina.

They also had the chance to share with an all-girl EpC and later went to the San José

grade school and met more Alerta Joven youth who talked about their experiences and dreams.

The visit ended with a lunch hosted executives from Sur Futuro's two major private sector alliances, PIISA (Parque Industrial San Cristobal) and Asobal (Asociacion Zonas Francas San

Cristobal) and youth from the Vocational Training for Employment Insertion program. The youth shared information their training and expectations for moving forward.

Sur Futuro has 450 youth enrolled in Alerta Joven programs with 150 attending EpCs in Haina. Sur Futuro is currently offering 7 technical / vocational training courses with an enrollment of 211 participants. To date, 87 participants have completed training and are in process of obtaining apprenticeships and new employment with the support of Alerta Joven.

With the cooperation of the governments of the Dominican Republic, United States and Chile, 200 youth were trained in entrepreneurship the vocational course "Youth Entrepreneurship and Employability" (Emprendimiento **Empleabilidad** y Juvenil) in San Francisco de Macoris and Boca Chica.

This training falls under the "Program for employment promotion for vulnerable youth in the Dominican Republic", implemented by the Ministry of Planning, Economy and Development (MEPyD) with technical support from the Agency for International Cooperation Chile (AGCIS), through the Solidarity and Social Investment Fund (FOSIS).

The 200 participants received their training through the Alerta Joven project funded by the United States Agency for International Development

(USAID) and implemented by Entrena SRL. Course facilitation was conducted by project partner organizations: Universidad Católica Nordestana (UCNE) of San Francisco de Macoris with 120 graduates and Caminante Boca Chica with an additional 80 graduates. The National Institute of Technical and Vocational Training (INFOTEP) and Chile's FOSIS were responsible for training and certifying the facilitators. The 80 hour course includes components on: life skills, market analysis, employability, development of entrepreneurial characteristics, employment strategy, preparation of business plans, financing, formalization and financial education.

This first group represents 16 percent of the total target of 1,284 young people that will be trained by the program with an investment of US \$ 158,000, financed by USAID through Alerta

Joven. The program expects to increase self-employment through the creation of microenterprises in the participating communities.

On June 9th and 10th, Rasheena Harris/Education Specialist and Elisané Alemar/Projects Specialist, from the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) in DR visited partner-organizations from Alerta Joven (At Risk Youth Project) managed by ENTRENA in the province of Puerto Plata.

The visit provided the opportunity to gather details of the different programs being implemented in Puerto Plata and to share experiences with the youth participants. The visit began on June 9th at the CEPROSH offices, where youth from

the Puerto Plata consortium (CEPROSH, Group Clara and COIN) shared experiences and described how their lives have changed since they became a part of Alerta Joven. These participating youth were drawn from a target sub sector of at-risk youth called MARP or Most At-Risk Populations which includes; lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, youth with STDs, youth who have exchanged sex for money and others.

Many of them presented testimonies about how after being part of the program they now know the true meaning of being healthy and embrace their true self without feeling scared of how society labels them. During the interchange, we could perceive how this group is very supportive of each other, and how they protect themselves and fight for their rights together as a group. The USAID team questioned the youth regarding their greatest needs, of which most of them responded that they need more

support with increasing awareness and protecting their rights with governmental authorities as well as the general population. They also felt they would benefit from technical/vocational training courses and employment insertion programs.

Following this meeting, USAID and Entrena staff visited and viewed business plan demonstrations prepared by Alerta Joven youth in anticipation of the Puerto Plata Self Employment Fair scheduled for later this summer. The participants described their projects and explained the business skills they used to develop them.





On the second day of visit, we visited DREAM Project in Cabarete where we observed their two programs, "Estrellas Jóvenes" and "A Ganar" with opportunities to converse with children taking part in the education retention program, Estrellas Jovenes, as well as older youth working in their internships as part of the A Ganar technical training and employment insertion program.

The goal of DREAM Project -Alerta Joven during the next 30 months is to rapidly increase its participant populations in all of its programs. Currently, there are 125 participants in the "Estrellas Jóvenes" program (divided into two student groups, one in the morning and one in the afternoon) and 62 in the program "A Ganar".

The Provincial Self-Employment and Entrepreneurship Fairs sponsored by Alerta Joven were held during the months of May and June 2015. With local coordination by implementing partners from different areas, the fairs took place in Boca Chica, Santo Domingo, Los Alcarrizos, San Francisco de Macoris, Santiago and Puerto Plata. The objective of these fairs was to select the best business plans that would participate in the National Business Fair. Fifty business plans qualified for participation at the National Fair, August 12, 2015 held in the main events salon, in the Sambil Commercial Center in Santo Domingo. 140 Alerta Joven youth had the opportunity to present their business plans. Over 480 people attended the daylong event.

The Self-Employment and Entrepreneurship Fair is an initiative of the Alerta Joven project, where in one forum participating youth present their business plans and where their entrepreneurship initiatives are recognized and celebrated. The fair recognizes their commitment, effort, creativity and vision in developing business strategies, which will generate income to achieve personal, professional, family and community goals for social inclusion.

The participants were evaluated by a panel of judges made up collaborators from the public and private sectors which included some of the most successful businesses in the Dominican Republic. Ten plans were awarded prizes based upon the innovation, scope, feasibility and sustainability of their business plans. The winners received a total of RD\$433,000.00 in prize money donated by Banco de Reservas de la República Dominicana.

Fundación Sur Futuro celebrates job fair with Alerta Joven



The objective of the fair was to increase formal employment opportunities for youth who had completed technical/vocational training courses sponsored by Alerta Joven in Haina, Quita Sueño and El Café de Herrera.

This program has provided a platform for more than 567 youth to receive training in different vocational fields (accounting, customer service, pharmacy assistant, electrical repair and







The event was held in the Esperanza (Hope) room of the Fundación office with the participation of youth in the Alerta Joven Project. The Alerta Joven Project is an initiative implemented by Entrena with financial support from the Agency of International Development of the United States, (USAID). The goal of Alerta Joven is reduce crime and juvenile violence through the active participation of youth in 5 development areas: education, health (prevention of HIV and other STDs)

documentation, employment generation and the reduction of violence at the community level.

The participating businesses evaluated candidates for employment vacancies and included: Almacenes Sema, Concesiones y Servicios S.A, Expreso Jade, Coop-Aspire y Grupo Ágape.
